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Chapter 1 SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

Note: This is a summary which covers all topics in this report. Most, but not all, tables contain information that is more current than was presented in the 2005 Knox County Healthy Community Analysis. For the most part, tables which are not updated information present 2000 "long form" Census data which are included in this report because they remain the best source for detailed social and economic data.

Summary points which are repeated from the 2005 Community Analysis are shown in italics.

Ch	apter 2: Population
	According to Census estimates, Knox County's 2006 population stood at 52,906, a decline of 2,930 persons (-5.2%) from the 2000 Census figure. The county's rate of population decline far surpassed the 1% decrease experienced between 1990 and 2000.
	Census estimates indicate that all fifeen communities in Knox County decreased in population from 2000 to 2006. During this six-year period, Galesburg lost 1,968 persons, while Abingdon fell by 260 residents. Proportionally, all communities except London Mills witnessed losses exceeding 5%.
	Since the 1980 Census, Knox County has lost population each decade, contrary to most earlier decades which witnessed growth. The fastest growth occurred during the 1950s when the population rose from 54,366 to 61,280, an increase of 12.7%.
	Since 2000, out-migration from Knox County has been very high. An estimated net 3,466 individuals migrated out of the countyfrom 2000 to 2006, five times as many as left during the 1990s. Natural increase, births minus deaths, stood at -536 in the six-year period, meaning that 536 more deaths than births took place from 2000 to 2006.
	According to Internal Revenue Service tax files, 2,121 persons left Knox County in 2005-2006 while 1,816 moved in, for a net loss of 305 persons. Four in ten (42.2%) movers from Knox County went to another state, while 57.8% stayed within Illinois. Of those who left the county, one in ten (10%) moved to Peoria County, while 7.3% went to Warren. These counties were also the two leading sources of movers into the county, with 10.3% of movers to Knox coming from Warren and 8.3% from Peoria.
	According to the 2000 Census, 1,036 persons resided in college dormitories, all in Galesburg. Also, as of the 2000 Census, 3,207 Knox County residents were enrolled in college, with 2,046 or 63.8% of enrollees being 18-24 years old. Knox College enrollment in the Fall 2005 semester was 1,205, an estimated 37% of all local residents enrolled in college.
Ch	apter 3: Race, Ethnicity, Language, Ancestry
	While most (90.4%) county residents are white, K nox is h ome to a substantial minor ity population comprised of blacks (7%), Asians (0.9%), and persons of two or more races (1.5%). Hispanics, an ethnic classification which may include persons of any race, make up 3.9% of the county's 2006 population.

According to 2006 Census estimates, Knox County's minority population grew while the white population decreased. From 2000-2006, the number of Asians increased by 28.5%, followed by Hispanics (+7.6%) and blacks (+4.9%). Persons of two or more races experienced a sight increase of 0.7%. The number of whites dropped by 2,342 (-4.7%).
When the county's 2006 population is categorized into race/ethnic categories, 86.9% are considered white, non-Hispanic; 6.7% black, non-Hispanic; and 3.9% Hispanic.
Knox County is less diverse than the nation as a whole or the state of III inois. White, non-Hispanics comprise 86.9% of the county's 2006 population, compared to 66.4%, U.S. and 65.3%, Illinois. The proportion of blacks in the county at 6.7% is about half the nation (12.3%) and state (14.7%) levels, while Hispanics at 3.9% are about one-third of the U.S. (14.8%) and Illinois (14.7%) proportions.
The 2000 Census figures showed that Knox County was 89.9% white, followed by 6.3% black. Just 0.7% of residents were Asian or Pacific Islander and 0.2% American Indian. "Other race" accounted for 1.6% of the population, while 1.4% identified themselves as being of two or more races. "Other race" is most likely largely Hispanic. 2000 was the first Census in which more than one race could be marked.
All races except white experienced growth during the 1990s with the county becoming more diverse. American Indians increased by 23.5%, followed by blacks (+22.8%), other race (+22.5%), and Asians (+19.7%). The number of whites in the county fell by 4.3%, compared to a one percent decline for the county's entire population.
The majority of Hispanics consider themselves to be either white (43.2%) or "other" race (44.3%). One in eleven (9.1%) Hispanics is of multiple races.
According to the 2000 Census, white non-Hispanics accounted for 82.1% of Galesburg's populace. About one in ten (10.2%) city residents is black. Almost all (97.9%) of the county's black population lives in Galesburg.
As of the Fall 2005 semester, white non-Hispanics comprised an estimated 75.4% of the Knox College total student enrollment, followed by 5.3% Hispanic and 5.1% for both blacks and Asians. Among the Hill Correctional Center prison population, almost two-thirds (65.7%) are black, while 21.3% of the inmates are white and 12.8% Hispanic. Over one-third (34.2%) of Knox County blacks are either prison inmates (32.5%) or Knox College students (1.7%).
Children ages 0-17 constitute a much higher percentage of the 2006 Hispanic (30.8%) and black (25.6%) populations than is true for white, non-Hispanics (20%).
The two leading ancestries in Knox County are German (19%) and Irish (12.4%). Swedish ancestry (11%) is much higher in the county than state (2.4%) and U.S. (1.4%) levels. English ancestry is also elevated in the county (11.6%).
In terms of Hispanic origin, almost three-fourths (73.1%) of Hispanic residents in Knox County are of Mexican ancestry, followed by Puerto Rican (2.3%) and Spanish (2%).
The vast majority of the Knox County population (98.4%) was born in the United States. According to the 2000 Census, 902 (1.6%) county residents are foreign-born, much lower than the state (12.3%) and U.S. (11.1%). Of the 902 Knox County immigrants, half have since become U.S. citizens.

	Accounting for almost one-third (31.7%) of Knox County's foreign-born residents, Mexico is the leading place of birth for local foreign-born, followed by Germany (7.9%) and Canada (5%).
	Among foreign-born individuals in the county, almost one-fourth (22.5%) are recent immigrants, coming to the United States between 1995 and the first quarter of 2000. About three of ten foreign-born residents arrived in the United States before 1965. The median year of entry was 1984.
	Of the 52,615 Knox County residents aged five and older, 4.2% responded that they regularly speak a language other than English, much lower than the U.S. proportion of 17.9%.
	Spanish, by far, is the leading non-English language spoken in Knox County, with 1,232 persons who speak Spanish regularly at home.
	Most Spanish-speaking individuals are also conversant in English. Of the 1,232 persons in Knox County who speak Spanish at home, eight of ten speak English very well (58.6%) or well (21.9%), with 19.5% saying they speak English "not well or not at all."
Ch	apter 4: Age And Gender
	With an older age structure than the nation, Knox County's 2006 median age of 40.3 years exceeds the U.S. median of 36.4 years by almost four years.
	The county's median age has increased about four years since 1990. A gain of 2.9 years occurred between 1990 (36.5) and 2000 (39.4), followed by a smaller increase of just under one year between 2000 and 2006. Consistently older than the nation, Knox County's 16-year median age increase of 3.8 years resembles the nation (+3.6).
	Based on 2006 estimates, one in five (21.0%) Krox County residents is under age 18,a smaller proportion than exists nationally (24.6%). The proportions for all Knox County age groups 55 and older are larger than the U.S. Elderly persons age 65 and older account for 17.7% of Knox County residents, substantially higher than the nation at 12.4%.
	Except for ages 45-64 year olds, the number of persons in all age groups decreased from 2000 to 2006. Proportionally, the largest drops occurred among 5-17 (-10.2%) and 25-44 (-9.8%) year olds.
	From 1990-2000, the number of Knox County persons in age groups 45 and older rose, with the largest increase taking place in the 45-64 year old "baby boomer" group (+16.7%). In 2000, persons ages 45-64 constituted almost one-fourth (24.1%) of the county's population, up from 20.5% in 1990. Persons ages 18-24 also grew slightly during the decade, an increase of 180 or 3.4%. The number of children dropped by 9.9% for 5-17 year olds and 5.2% for under 5.
	The median age for Knox County women is 42.7 years, four and a half years older than males (38.0), owing to gender differences in longevity and, possibly, the younger male age structure at Hill Correctional Center. Blacks (29.8 years) and Hispanics (28.3) are much younger than whites (42.1).
	Black inmates at Hill Correctional Center comprise 62.3% of the Knox County adult black male population, rising to 78.5% of black males in the 25-34 age group.

	Knox County contains 26,393 males compared to 26,513 males. The gender rato (males per 100 females) in 2006 stood at 99.5, up slightly from 99.2 in 2000 and 96.0 in 1990. In all age groups under 60, except for ages 4549, the ratio favors males, especially for persons ages 20-24. Women outnumber men among all ages 60 years and older with a difference that widens as age increases so that at ages 85+, only 42.7 males are living for every 100 females.
	Both blacks and Hispanics exhibit a substantial excess of males, most likely the result of the Hill Correctional Center population. The black gender ratio in the 2006 Census estimate stood at a very high 215.2, compared to just 93.6 for whites. The Hispanic ratio was 127.7. In most places, the Hispanic gender ratio favors males.
Ch	apter 5: Household Characteristics, Marital Status, And Marriage/Divorce
	Over nine in ten (92.2%) Knox County residents live in a household, defined as "one or more persons occupying a housing unit." The majority of persons living in a household (82.6%) belong to a family (two or more related persons living together).
	About one in six (17.4%) local individuals resides in a nonfamily housing unit, including 6,539 individuals (12.7%) who live alone.
	The number of Knox County households stood at 22,056 in the 2000 Census. Almost two-thirds (65.4%) of households were family households, slightly lower than the 67.6% for Illinois and 68.1% for the nation. Fewer than one in five (18.8%) Knox County households are "traditional" married couples with children, below state (24.3%) and U.S. (23.5%) levels. In 2000, the county contained 1,959 (8.9%) single parent households, similar to Illinois (8.8%) and the U.S. (9.3%). Of the single parent households, 77.9% are headed by a female.
	The average household size was 2.33 persons in the 2000 Census, lower than both state (2.63) and U.S. (2.59) averages. The average family has just 2.87 persons, somewhat smaller than Illinois (3.23) and U.S. (3.14) families. When examined by race/ethnicity, white households (2.31) recorded a lower 2000 average size than Hispanic (2.78) and black (2.70) households.
	Since 1980, the average size of a Knox County household has declined steadily, from 2.59 for 1980, dropping to 2.42 in the 1990 Census and, dropping again to 2.33 persons in 2000. The average Knox County family size has followed a similar pattern, falling from 3.11 persons in 1980 to 2.87 in 2000.
	Over six in ten (62.7%) Knox County children under age 18 live in a married couple family, slightly lower than state (67%) and national (66%) proportions. Living with a single female are 22% of Knox County children, while 5.2% reside with a single male. The level of children living with a single parent is higher than found statewide and for the nation.
	In 2000, 668 Knox County children or 5.4% were living in a home where a grandparent is the householder, below state (6.6%) and U.S. (6.3%) proportions. The percentage of Hispanic (9.4%) and black (9%) children in the county who live with a grandparent is almost double the rate for white (4.9%) children.
	Almost nine in ten persons aged 65 and older in Knox County were a householder or spouse in 2000, whether living in a family or nonfamily household. Almost one-third (31.8%) of the county's elderly lived alone, primarily women. The number of elderly women living alone stood at 2,393 in the 2000 Census, representing one in four elderly. One in eleven (9.6%) Knox County elderly resides in group quarters.

Households in Galesburg are a bit smaller, an average size of 2.24 persons, than the county overall (2.33) and much smaller than rural Knox County households (2.71). Average family size in Galesburg is exactly the same as the Knox County average (2.87). Galesburg is also home to a smaller proportion of married-couple with children families (16%) compared to the county (18.8%) and rural Knox County (23%). Single mother households are much more common in Galesburg (8.3%) than in the rural area (4.9%).
Knox County contained 1,108 unmarried partner households according to the 2000 Census. Of these, 90.6% are male/female households, with 6.3% containing persons who are both male, and 3.1% in which the individuals are both female. The county has a lower proportion of same sex partners than found in the state or nation. Three-fourths (820) of the county's unmarried partner households are in Galesburg.
The number of Knox County residents living in group quarters in 2000 was 4,370, comprising 7.8% of the population. Those living in a correctional institution (1,864) accounted for 42.6% of these persons, while individuals in college dorms (1,036) comprised 23.7% of the group quarters population. About one in five (21%) live in a nursing home. Few individuals reside in other types of group quarters.
The majority of institutionalized persons (68.9%) are 18-64 years old, primarily Hill Correctional inmates, while 29.2% are elderly, living primarily in nursing homes and congregate living. All but 121 of those in noninstitutionalized group quarters are in the 18-64 age group, with many most likely living in Knox College dormitories.
Among Knox County residents aged 15 and older, over one in five (21.6%) are single (never married), 56.2% are married, 14% divorced or separated, and 8.3% widowed. The county contains slightly higher levels of married persons than the state and U.S., as well as elevated levels of divorced individuals and widowed.
A much higher percentage of women than men are widowed. About one in eight Knox County women (12.7%) is widowed, compared to just 3.6% of men. Longevity in women is a partial factor; additionally, older men tend to remarry. Also, at the time of the 2000 Census more females were divorced than men. Males reveal higher proportions of "never married" and married.
Peak "married" levels are reached in the 60-64 age group for local men (81.4%) and in the 45-54 age group for women (69.1%). The proportion of women in their 20s who are married (36.6%) is higher than the rate for men (25.5%) in that age range.
Marriage levels for women fall considerably from age 65, especially for women 75 and older. Older men exhibit a much higher level of marriage than older women. While 58.8% of Knox County men aged 75+ are married, just 23.9% of women in this age group are married. More than twice as many women (55.6%) than men (25.8%) aged 75+ are widowed.
Hitting a five-year low, Knox County reported 178 divorces in 2004 for a dissolution ratio of 49.4 divorces per 100 marriages. The county's dissolution ratio has exceeded the state and nation since 2000. Knox County recorded its highest 25-year dissolution ratio in 988 at 85.7 and the lowest in 1999 at 36.4.

Chapter 6: Housing According to Cersus estimates, Knox County contained 23,981 housing units in 2005, a 1.1% increase over 2000. By comparison, the number of housing units in the state increased 6.4% in the same five-year period. Knox County contained 23,717 housing units in 2000. Of those 23,717 units, 7% or 1,661 were vacant on April 1, 2000 with vacancies far more common in rental units (7.7%) than owner occupied (1.6%) units. Of the vacant units, 289 were for seasonal, recreational, or occasional use, while the remainder were permanent residences. Vacancy rates are generally similar to the state and nation. ☐ The housing supply was virtually stable from 1990 to 2000. Owner-occupied units expanded by 4.2%, while rental units fell significantly (-7.3%). ☐ Home ownership stood at 71.6% in 2000, rising from 69.1% of housing units occupied by the owner in 1990. Home ownership locally is higher than the national level which stood at 66.2% in 2000. Differences exist in home ownership according to the ethnic category of the householder in that the level of white households who own their home (73.2%) is slightly higher than Hispanic (68.6%), while black home ownership (42.3%) is considerably lower. Level of home ownership also varies by age of the householder. Among age groups, home ownership in 2000 was highest among 65-74 year olds at 84.2%, followed closely by ages 55-64. Householders under the age of 35 exhibit the lowest home ownership levels, with 19.2% for under 25 and 51.9% for ages 25-34. During the decade of the 1990s, home ownership grew in all age groups except 35-44 and 45-54, both of which had very slight declines. ☐ The area's housing stock is dominated by one-unit detached (single family) homes, comprising 76.2% of total housing units in 2000. The next most common housing type is structures with 5-9 units, constituting 2.8% of homes, while 1.6% are attached single units such as townhouses. Larger structures with 10 or more units represent 6.4% of structures. Over the past decade, one-unit attached homes provided the largest growth with 207 additional units, more than doubling during the decade. ☐ The median number of rooms in Knox County housing units stood at 5.6 in 2000, indicating that local homes tend to have slightly more rooms than found in either the state (5.4) or nation (5.4). Almost six in ten (57.8%) local residents ages 5+ lived in the same home in 2000 as they did in 1995, similar to the state (56.8%) and nation (54.1%). Of the 40.7% of residents who resided in the U.S. in 1995, but in a different home, more than half had lived elsewhere in Knox County in 1995, while most of the remainder came from another county, primarily within Illinois. ☐ More than half (55.2%) of Knox County residents in 2000 had moved into their present

☐ The median year in which Knox County housing units were built was 1952. Thus, the housing stock is much older than the state as a whole (1962), as well as the nation (1971) where housing, on average, is much newer. Six of ten Knox County houses were built before 1960.

	The median home value was \$63,500 across all of Knox County, based on Census figures. Home appreciation was far greater proportionally in Knox County, up 74.2% from 1990, than occurred for the U.S. (+52.4%).
	Based on data from the Illinois Association of Realtors, 679 single family homes were sold in Knox County in 2006 at a medianprice of \$61,500,less than one-third of the statewide median at \$195,000. For both the county and state, the median price of homes sold in 2006 fell from the year before, a 1% drop for Knox and a 2% drop for Illinois.
	Median home value is highest for white non-Hispanic homes at \$64,000. Median Hispanic home value in 2000 was \$48,700, and for black homes, the median stood at \$48,900.
	Rents throughout the county are lower, on average, than those elsewhere. The 2000 median gross rent of \$411 was well under the state (\$605) and nation (\$602). Hispanic median gross rent (\$596) was highest, perhaps due to the larger family size. Black gross rent (\$411) was similar to the white level.
	Renters are somewhat more likely to pay more of their income for housing than are owners. Paying 30% or more of their income in 2000 were 30.1% of renters as compared to just 13.5% of home owners.
	By age group, households with a householder aged 65-74 (18%) are most likely to spend 30% or more of their income for housing, followed by young people age 15-24 (16.8%). Those aged 55-64 (9.9%) are the least likely to spend 30% or more of income for housing.
	Overall, 2.8% of Knox County households lacked phones in 2000 and 11.8% did not have access to a vehicle. The highest proportions without phones are those homes with younger householders reaching 12.1% of those under 25. Senior citizens 75+ (20.1%) are the group most likely not to have a vehicle.
Ch	apter 7: Education And Employment
	More than eight in ten (81.8%) Knox County adults aged 25 years and older are high school graduates as reported in the 2000 Census. The Knox County population has become more educated over time, rising from 68.4% holding a high school diploma in 1980 to 76.6% in 1990 to the current figure of 81.8%.
	Bachelor's degrees have been obtained by one in seven (14.6%) Knox County adults, far lower than the state at 26.1% and nation at 24.4%. One in twenty (4.9%) county adults has obtained a graduate degree, a slight increase from 1990 at 4.2% and about half the 2000 statewide figure of 9.5%.
	While 84.6% of the Knox County white population has graduated from high school, fewer than half (48.6%) of the black adults and about two in three (62.9%) Hispanics have earned a high school diploma. The same disparity exists for bachelor's degrees with 15.2% of whites completing four years of college (or more) as compared to 4.7% among blacks and 6% of Hispanics.
	In 2005-2006, two of the five Kn ox County school districts failed to exceed the statewide graduation rate of 87.8%. At 80.1%, Galesburg School District's graduation rate fell almost eight percentage points below the state average, while Abingdon was lower than the state by about five percentage points. The county's three other school districts. Knoxville, ROWVA, and

Both Abingdon and Galesburg experienced declines in 2005-2006 graduation rates over the 2001-2002 levels. In Knox County, six in ten (60.6%) adults ages 16 years and older worked during 2000, about the same level as experienced ten years earlier at 60.5%. During the last twenty years, male participation in the Knox County labor force has declined from 74.7% in 1980 to 64.3% in 2000, a drop of ten percentage points. Females, on the other hand, saw gains in participation from 50.1% in 1980 to 57% in 2000. ☐ Knox County females with children were more likely to be employed in 2000 than their state and national counterparts. Almost three in four (73.1%) females with preschool aged children were labor force participants in 2000, far higher than Illinois at 62% or U.S., 61.9%. The 2000 level of Knox County working females with preschoolers witnessed a big jump from 1990 at 55.7%. Likewise, more Knox County females with school aged children were employed in 2000, with a rate of 84.2%, than statewide at 75.8% or nationally, 75%. The county's proportion of working mothers with school age children rose over the decade by almost ten percentage points, from 75.2% in 1990. Since 2000, Knox County's unemployment has exceeded state and national levels by one or two percentage points, reversing a trend ex perienced in the mid to I ate 1990s when the county's level fell below Illinois and the U.S. In 2006, Knox County unemployment stood at 5.4%, down from 7.4% in 2005 and the 18-year high of 8.4% in 2004. ☐ The number of KnoxCounty abor force paticipants (both employed and unemployed) in 2006 at 25,702 has dropped by 14% from the 26-year high of 29,721 abor force participants in 1992. ☐ Males are more likely to be unemployed than females. In 2006, 6.5% of the county's male labor force participants were unemployed compared to 4.1% of females. Among race and ethnic groups, blacks exhibit higher unemployment than whites or Hispanics. ☐ In 2007. Burlington Northern Sante Fe Railroad provided the most Galesburg-based jobs with 1,115 employees, while in the greater Galesburg area, Farmland Foods located in Monmouth (Warren County) rarked first with 1,350 workers. Among the top employers, three are devoted to education: Galesburg School District 205, Carl Sandburg College, and Knox College. Two others concentrate on medical care, Galesburg Cottage Hospital and OSF St. Mary Medical Center. Knox County workers travel, on average, 18.2 minutes to work as compared to a national average of 25.5 minutes. Seven in ten (70.2%) spend less than 20 minutes getting to work, including the 3% who work at home. About one in twenty (4.8%) Knox County workers travel an hour or more to work, far less than 7.7% of the nation's workers and less than half the Illinois proportion of 10.5%. ☐ Most Knox County residents (85.1%) work in the county. For those who leave the county, the most common commuting destination in 2000 was Peoria County where 5% of Knox residents worked, followed by Warren (2.8%) and Henry (1.3%) Counties. ☐ Employees who work in Knox County, for the most part (80.4%), live within the county's borders. The county's employers also draw residents from Warren (8.9%), Fulton (2.4%), Henry (1.9%), Mercer (1.3%), and Peoria (1.3%) Counties.

Williamsfield, achieved 100% graduation in 200 5-2006. Compared to four years earlier, graduation rates maintained their high levelat ROWVA and Williamsfield and rose for Koxville.

	Three occupational categories dominate the workforce in Knox County. Management, professional, and related occupations top the list, accounting for 26.7% of employed workers, followed by sales and office occupations and production and transportation (both 23.2%). Of these three leading occupational groups, production and transportation captures a far greater proportion of workers than exists nationally at 14.6%.
	Six in ten Knox County workers, as defined by industry, fall into one of three classifications: education, health and social services (25.5%), manufacturing (18%), and retail trade (13.2%). With more than one-quarter of employees working in education, health and social services, Knox County surpasses the nation at 19.9%.
	From 1990 to 2006, jobs declined, with an 11.5% loss in nonfarm employees and 14.5% loss within the private sector. When analyzed by goods versus services, the goods-producing jobs declined by 72.5% w hile service jobs grew by 12%. The major setback occurred within manufacturing, 79.8% fewer jobs in 2006 than 1990. Jobs within the financial sector also fell markedly, a decrease of 33.3%. Two categories of jobs practically doubled their 1990 levels, information (+98.2%) and professional/business services (+90.4%).
	In 2006, labor force participants numbered 14,735 in 2006, about 1,200 fewer than six years earlier. Unemployment for 2006 stood at 5.7%, down sharply from the 2004 level of 9.1%.
	Using 2000 Census data, Galesburg shows a bit lower proportion of high school graduates at 79.2% than the county as a whole, though the proportion of college graduates is a little higher at 14.9%.
Ch	apter 8: Income And Poverty
	The 2004 Knox County median household income (\$36,358) was substantially lower than the medians for Illinois (\$47,711) and the U.S. (\$44,334). From 1999-2004, Knox County's median household income rose by a very small amount (+2.7%) from \$35,407, similar to the five-year state increase (+2.4%) and about half the U.S. (+5.6%). In contrast, the grow th in median household income from 1989 to 1999 was significant, with Knox County's median household income gaining by 44.3%, almost matching the state increase of 44.5% and topping the U.S. gain of 39.7%.

	Among ethnic groups, the 1999 median household income for white, non-Hispanics stood at \$36,323, 42.4% higher than the median for black households (\$20,927), but slightly lower than the Hispanic household median of \$36,786.
	Knox County families, defined as two or more related persons living in a household, earn a median income (\$44,010), far higher than nonfamily households (\$21,084) which include a number of college students and elderly householders. The county's 1999 per capita income was \$17,985. Median income for all local household types are below Illinois and the nation.
	Married-couple families with children claim the highest 1999 median income at \$51,393, almost

The highest proportion of households earn in the \$50,000-\$59,999 range. For families, an equal proportion (12.6%) earn either \$50,000-\$59,999 or \$60,000-\$74,999. One-third of area households earned less than \$25,000 in 1999, while 12% received incomes of \$75,000 or more.
In 2005, Knox County's per capita personal income (PCPI) of \$25,442 stood at 74% of the U.S. PCPI, a record low comparison to the U.S., and was 30% lower than the state (\$32,965). The county's 2005 PCPI reflected a very modest 0.6% rise from 2004.
More Knox County residents lived in poverty in 2004 (13.4%) as a proportion of the population than the state (11.9%) and nation (12.7%), according to Census estimates.
During the 1990s, poverty declined locally, following state and national trends, but has risen since 1999. Knox County's 1999 level of 11.1% dropped from 13.9% in 1989, before climbing to 13.4% in 2004.
One in five (19.9%) Knox County children ages 0-17 lived in a poor home in 2004, far higher than the poverty level for the population as a whole (13.4%), a pattern mirroring Illinois and the nation although the local gap is wider. The county's rate for children in poverty exceeds both the state (16.7%) andU.S. (17.8%). Aswith poverty rates for the entire population, proportions of county children in poverty declined during the nineties, falling from 19.2% in 1989 to 16.8% in 1999. The 2004 census estimate comes close to the 1989 level of local children in poverty.
Poverty rates differ considerably by ethnicity. Knox County blacks (44.1%) and Hispanics (12.3%) recorded 1999 poverty levels much higher than the white proportion (9.2%). However, the Knox County black level is almost double the proportion for Illinois (26%) and U.S. (24.8%).
Among household groups, female-headed families are most likely to be poor, particularly female-headed families with young children. Almost three in ten (28.9%) female-headed families lived below the poverty threshold in 1999, reaching 56.2% of female-headed families with children under 5. The lowest levels of poverty are experienced by senior citizens (6%) and families (7.7%).
Three in ten Knox County residents lived between poverty and 200% of poverty or twice the poverty level (1999).
In July 2007, the number of persons receiving Medicaid in Knox County topped 10,000 for the first time. At 10,046 Medicaid recipients, the 2007 figure represents 19.1% of the county's population, another record high, and is 58% more than the number of Medicaid-eligible ten years earlier. Thenumber of Medicaid recipients in the county has risen every year since 2000.
Galesburg's poverty level (14.7%, 1999) was higher than Knox County overall (11.1%) and more than double the poverty level for rural Knox County (6.2%). Almost one-fourth (23.4%) of Galesburg children are living in poverty, more than triple the proportion in the rural area (7.7%).
Galesburg's 1999 median household income (\$31,987) was somewhat lower than Knox County as a whole (\$35,407). Median family income follows the same pattern, standing at \$41,796 in 1999. Galesburg's 1999 per capita income of \$17,214 was similar to the county (\$17,985).

Chapter 9: Natality Knox County reported 559 births in 2005, continuing a downward trend in annual births. The county's birth rate has declined fairly steadily, hitting a record low of 10.5 births per 1,000 population in 2005. ☐ The county's birth rate has consistently fallen be low the state and nation, generally running about 20% to 30% lower than Illinois and U.S. ☐ Knox County's 2005 fertility stood at 58.1 births per 1,000€ males ages 15-44, droppingslightly from 59.2 in 2000 and 61.2 in 1990. By contrast, both the state and nation witnessed steeper 15-year fertility declines, from 72.9 to 66.4 for Illinois and 70.9 to 66.7, U.S. Births in Knox County are predominantly white, though the proportion of black and Hispanic births has grown over the past twenty-five years. Up until the early 1990s, Hispanic babies made up no more than 2.5% of the total, but 1993 began a shift to increasing Hispanic births, reaching a peak in 1996 (47 Hispanic births, 7.4% of all). In 2004 and 2005, Hispanic births comprised 6.1% of all countybirths. Since 1985, the proportion of black births has ranged from 4.4% to 8.1%. In 2005, threein ten (30.2%) Knox County births were born to women ages 25-29 years of age. a larger proportion than occurred statewide (27.5%) or nationally (27.3%). More county babies were also born to mothers ages 20-24 (27.9%) than is true for Illinois and U.S. births. Babies born to mothers ages 30 year and older are ess common in Knox County, with 19.1% of births to women ages 30-34, compared to 24.9% and 23.0% for the state and nation, whereas the proportional differences are even greater for ages 35-39,6.6% for Knox, about half the Illinois (12.9%) and U.S. (11.7%) levels. ☐ The younger age distribution of mothers in Knox isalso reflected in the medan age, 26.2 years in Knox County for 2005, at least one and a half years younger than Illinois (28.3) and U.S. (27.7).Knox County exhibited lower 2005 fertility for all ages 20 years and older than the U.S. The difference is greatest for mothers in their thirties, with the county's ages 30-34 fertility 25% below the U.S. rate and ages 35-39, 46% lower. ☐ In 2005, 82 Knox County babies were born to mothers under the age of 20, 14.7% of allbirths, an eight-year high. Consistently, the county's teen bith proportion has exceeded the state and nation, with the largest excess occurring in 2005. ☐ In 2005, almost half of all Knox County births (47.8%) were born to unmarried mothers, the highest level yet recorded and triple the 1980 level. The increasing number of babies born to unmarried mothers in Knox County reflects a trend occurring statewide and nationally, whose levels stand at a little more than one-third of births born to unmarried women.

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 One in ten (10%) of Knox County babies weighed less than 2,500 grams at births in 2005, marking a 25-year peak. The proportion of low weight babies has inched upward since 1980.

☐ In 2005, almost nine in ten (87.8%) Knox County births received first trimester prenatal care, a level similar to the proportion of the five previous years and higher than was true in the 1990s

similar to state and national trends.

	Compared to the U.S., Knox County experienced higher 2004 death rates for all age groups 25 years and older except ages 55-64. The widest excess, with county rates more than 20% above national rates, are for ages 45-54 and 65-74.

Over the past ten years, Knox County heart disease crude rates have dropped dramatically, from 442.2 deaths per 100,000 population in 1995 to 360.1 in 2005. The county's cancer death rate also fell in the past decade, a 14% drop, from 300.1 in 1995 to 256.9 in 2005.
Three leading death causes witnessed substantially higher crude death rates in 2005 over 1995, with gains of more than 100%: diabetes, nephritis, and septicemia.
Knox County's top eightdeath causes for 2004 exhibit higher cruce death rates than Illinois and U.S.
Using age-adjusted rates that eliminate the differences due to age structures, three of the top five 2004 death causes in Knox County show rates that exceed the U.S. and Illinois by at least 10%. The county's stroke and chronic lower respiratory diseases age-adjusted rates stood 40% above national and state rates, while heart disease was 12% higher. The county's cancer death rate stood 8% above the U.S.
Comparing the county's age-adjusted death rates over time for leading death causes, shows 1994 to 2004 declines for heart disease and cancer, an increase for chronic lower respiratory diseases and accidents, while stroke stayed about the same.
Heart disease accounted for just over one in four (27.3%) deaths in 2003-2005 whereas ten years earlier, more than one in three (33.8%) Knox County deaths was due to heart disease. Cancer captured one in five (20.5%) 2003-2005 deaths, a smaller percentage than ten years earlier at 23.8%. Co nversely, chronic lower respiratory diseases accounted for a larger proportion of 2003-2005 deaths at 7.1% versus 5.8% experienced ten years earlier.
Knox County males display higher 2002-2004 age-adjusted death rates for eight of the ten leading causes than women. Only stroke and Alzheimer's had higher female rates. Showing the widest gaps between the two genders, with at least a 50% excess among men, are heart disease, accidents, suicide, and nephritis (kidney disease).
One in six (17.7%) Knox County 2002-2004 deaths occurred to persons under the age of 65, comparing favorably to the state's higher premature mortality of 25.8%. Four causes claimed a disproportionate share of early death, with more than four in ten deaths taking place under age 65: homicide (100.0%), suicide (100.0%), chronic liver disease & cirrhosis (87.5%), and accidents (44.4%).
Cancer led all other causes of death for years of potential life lost in Knox County, accounting for 310 lost years in 2001, far more than the next leading causes, accidents (230 YPLL) and heart disease which produced 210 lostyears. Malesaccounted for more than twicethe number of lost years as females.
White persons comprised the vast majority (95.2%) of 2004 Knox County deaths with blacks accounting for 4.5%. Hispanics, who may be of any race, accounted for 1.8% of deaths.
Despite showing a lower crude death rate than whites, Knox County blacks exhibited a much higher 2004 age-adjusted death rate at 1,457.4 per 100,000 population compared to 889.3 for whites. The racial disparity also exists state and nationwide, although the gap isnot as great.
For both heart disease and cancer, age-adjusted death rates are higher among the county's blacks than whites.

	Blacks are much more I ikely to die before their 65 th birthday than whites with one in three (36.4%) Knox County blacks dying before age 65 as compared to one in seven (15.7%) for whites. The proportion of premature death among Hispanics at 22.2% lies closer to the white percentage than the black.
	Among Knox County's youngest age group, ages 0-14, perinatal conditions and congenital malformations led among death causes for years 2002-2004. Suicide ranked first for ages 15-24, while cancer and accidents were leading causes among ages 25-44.
	Cancer was theleading killer for Knox County residents, 45-64 years old, claiming one in three (33.3%) deaths, followed by heart disease with 19.8%. Cancer also produced the most deaths for the "young elderly," ages 65-74, with 41% of deaths, followed by heart disease with 19.1%.
	By a wide margin, heart disease led cancer and other causes for Knox County residents ages 75+, accounting for 31.4% of deaths. Cancer placed second with 13.8% and stroke was third with 8.5% of deaths among the oldest age group.

	Most (65.3%) Knox County adults enjoyed good mental health during all days of the past month in 2004, while 13.7% of Knox adults said they experienced poor mental health for more than one week of the past month, an increase over the 12.5% reported in 2001 and 9.4% in 1997.
	In 2004, seven in ten (70.5%) Knox County adults perceived their physical health to be good all days of the past month while one in ten (10.5%) said their physical health was poor for more than seven of the past 30 days. The 2004 levels of physical health show improvement over 2001 figures but not 1997.
	In 2004, 11.0% of Knox County adults could not perform their routine tasks due to health limitations for eight or more days in the past month, a lower proportion than was the case in 2001 at 16.8%.
	Based on estimates from the Knox County Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance Survey, one in five (22.7%) adults suffers from arthritis while 23.4% live with high blood pressure and 10.4% have asthma. One in three adults (29.6%) reports high cholesterol while diabetes afflicts 8.0%.

Almost half (48.3%) of Knox County adults consider themselves to be overweight or obese, level quite a bit below the state at 58.6%. About one in seven (15.1%) reported binge drinkir in the past month. The proportion of Knox County adults who currently smoke is 22.6%, a lev that essentially matches Illinois.	
Showing levels higher than the state, two-thirds (66.0%) of all Knox County women ages 40 years and older have had a mammography exam and most of these (91.7%) have had a mammogram within the past year.	
In Knox County, more than three in five (61.5%) men ages 40 years or older have obtained a PSA test. A greater proportion (71.5%) have had a digital rectal exam. Among the population 50 years and older, 42.4% have received a sigmoidoscopy and about the same percentage (39.2%) have completed a blood stool test.	
Knox County's 2000-2004 a ge-adjusted cancer incidence rate of 490.1 cases per 10 0,000 population resembles the state at 484.3. Cancer occurs more often in the county's men with a rate of 553.2 than women, 451.3.

In 2006, hepatitis led all other reportable communicable diseases in the county with the three forms of hepatitis, A, B, and C, accountingfor 37 cases, more than reported in any recent year. No other communicable disease, excluding sexually transmitted diseases, had more than three reported cases in 2006.	
With 2005 rates more than double the level of ten years ago, Knox County has witnessed a steep rise in chlamydia rates. The 2005 rate \pm 368.9 chlamyda cases per 100,000 population, along with the 206 reported cases was a 15-year high in the county.	
In Knox County, two AIDS cases were reported in the first sixmonths of 2007 for acumulative total of 69 cases since January 1981. Human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) disease had five reported cases in 2007 (through June) and 29 cumulative cases from July 1999 through June 2007.	
Of the 915 Kno x County children tested in 2005 for elevated blood lead levels, 26 or 2.80 showed blood lead levels of 15 or more micro grams per deciliter. The number of child retested in 2005 was an eight-year high, however, the proportion of children with elevated blood lead level was a six-year low.	
Based on a statewide clinic assessment survey conducted by the Illinois Department of Public Health in 2005, almost six in ten (59%) Knox County children seen in the public health clinics were adequately immunized for diphtheria/pertussis/tetanus, polio, measles/mumps/rubella, and Haemophilus influenza type B.	

Almost one of five (18.3%) local residents ages 5 and older reported a disability in 2000, similar to the nation (19.3%). Knox County children ages 5-15 recorded higher levels of disability than the U.S. for all disabilities except sensory, with mental disability being the most common (6.2%). Among ages 16-64, 14.9% of county residents reported a disability, most frequently an employment disability (11.9%). The highest level of disability is seen among the elderly, with 40% of Knox County senior reporting a disability, most often a physical disability (26.9%).
A total of 1,21 9 Knox Co unty students received special e ducation services in sc hool year 2005/2006. Accounting for 8.5% of the special education students, 16 was the peak age. The two largest categories of student exceptional characteristics are specific learning disability (42.1%) and speech/language impairment (22.4%).
Based on national prevalence rates in <i>Mental Health: A Report of the Surgeon General, 1999</i> that have been applied to the estimated 2006 age structure of KnoxCounty, anestimated 5,930 Knox County residents ages 18-54 have been affected by a mental disorder in the past year. The leading mental disorders are simplephobia (2,344), major depressive episode (1,86), and unipolar major depressive disorder (1,497). Approximately 3,096 Knox County residents ages 55 years and older have a mental disorder, most often simple phobia (1,141), followed by severe cognitive impairment (1,032).
The number of Knox County residents ages 12 years and older who have used illicit drugs in the past month is estimated to be about 3,725 persons based on 2005 National Household Survey on Drug Abuse findings. More than two in three illegal drug users use marijuana, an estimated 2,768 persons. The number of county residents who use illicit drugs other than marijuana is app roximately 1,675, with non-medical use of psycho therapeutic medications being the leading category of drug use.
Among legal substances, alcohol is used by the most residents, followed by t obacco. An estimated 21,000 Knox County residents have consumed alcohol in the past month and 3,074 are heavy alcohol users. An estimated 11,720 county residents have smoked digarettes in the past 30 days.
Substance use varies somewhat by race with blacks a little more likely to have used an illicit drug in the past month (9.7% among ages 12+) versus whites (8.1%) and Hispanic (7.6%), according to national proportions. Gender differences also exist with males much more likely to have used an ille gal drug (10.2% of ages 12+) than females (1,404). Applyi ng these proportions to Knox County's population reveals 3,247 white users of illegal substances, 298 black users, and 123 Hispanics. An estimated 2,309 county men have used illicit drugs and 1,404 females. For égarette and alcohol use, white rates exceed black and Hispanic rates with a great er than t en perce ntage point exc ess of whites ov er blacks and H ispanics for consumption of alcohol in the past month.
Results from the Illin ois Youth S urvey indicate that from 20 04 to 2006, p ast month use of cigarettes and marijuana dropped for 6 th , 8 th , and 10 th grade students, while alcohol use fell for 8 th and 10 th graders but rose slightly among 6 th graders. For the most part, use rates of other drugs among 8 th , 10 th , and 12 th graders fell below state levels, although the count y's sample size was too small to make reliable comparisons in most drug categories.
During 2005, DUI arrests in KnoxCounty totaled 221, for arate of 507.5 per100,000 population ages 16+. The 2005 figure, along with 2003 (218, 500.6 arrests per population 16+), is lower than half the 567 DUI arrests, 1,301.9 per 100,000 occurring in 2004. The county's DUI rates for 2003 and 2 005 resemble the state, while the 2004 rate is more than double the Illinois figure.

Chapter 12: Health Resources And Utilization

Most Knox County adults (84.9%) reported having a health plan in 2004, very similar to Illinois adults statewide at 85.9%, however, somewhat lower than the county's 2001 (87.7%) and 1997 (90.1%) levels. About the same proportion of adults had a regular health care provider in 2004 (84.4%) as had health coverage. One in ten (9.6%) Knox County adults ages 18+ avoided the doctor due to cost, dropping from 11.4% in 2001.
Medicare enrollment reveals that 9,301 aged 65+ and 1,387 disabled were enrolled in 2003, representing 19.6% of the population.
Compared to the U.S., K nox County residents were hospitalized 36% more often in 2006. Largely due to diagnoses related to childbirth, the county's female hospitalization rate stood about 38% above the men's rate, an excess that also exists nationally. Among the four major age groups, the county's children, ages 0-17 exhibited lower hospitalization rates than Illinois children as a whole, but the other three age groups were higher with a wider gap between the county and nation for ages 45-64 and 65+ than ages 18-44.
Similar to thenational comparison, Knox County residents were hospitalized about a third more frequently than statewide in 2006. Both males and females displayed this excess. In 2006, Knox County men were hospitalized at a rate of 1,346.6 per 10,000 population, 37% above the Illinois figure. Similarly, county women were hospitalized at a rate of 1,852.7, 33% higher than statewide.
For statewide comparison, age cat egories were divided into six groups. W hile the county's 2006 hospitalization rates rose above statewide for all age groups, the widest differences occurred for ages 45-64 and 65-74.
The county's top two reasons for hospitalization in 2006 were birth-related with normal newborn being the number one diagnosis and uncomplicated vaginal delivery placing second.
Among non birth-related reasons for hospitalization, pneumonia and pleurisy was the leading diagnosis with 304 discharges in 2006. Close behind were chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) and hip/knee replacement with 297 and 295 discharges, respectively.
Among the county's top 25 di agnoses, three produced average charges topping \$3 0,000: percutaneous cardiovascular procedure with drug-eluting stent (\$42,375),respiratory infection and inflammation (\$34,913), and hip/knee replacement (\$33,940).
Among the 2006 & ading hospitalization reasons, several have shown steep rises in the number of discharges over the past decade. Psychoses accounted for 241 discharges in 2006, compared to 127 in2000 and 96 in 1995, while digestive disorders had 221 dscharges in 2006 versus 129 in 1995. Hospitalizations for respiratory infection and in flammation more than doubled from 42 in 1995 to 119 in 2006. Both ren al failure and ne onates with significant problems at 74 and 72 discharges, respectively, in 2006 were 50% higher than their 1995 levels. Showing a much lower number of discharges in 2006 over eleven years earlier were normal newborns and uncomplicated vaginal delivery.
Comparing hospital discharge rates to the state, twenty of the top 25 diagnoses among Knox County residents were higher than Illinois. Showing the greatest discrepancy with county rates more than double the state were hip/knee replacement, respiratory inflection and inflammation, transient ischemia, and cardiac arrhythmia and conduction disorders.

Excluding birth-related diagnoses, Knox County males and females had similar reasons for hospitalization with the same diagnoses ranking in the top eight for both genders. Exhibiting a difference were respiratory infections which was much more common am ong men, while gastrointestinal hemorrhage more frequently was thecause of hospitalization among females.
Besides birth diagnoses, Knox County infants and toddlers, ages 0 to four were most often hospitalized in 20 06 for b ronchitis and asthma, digesti ve disorders, and pneumon ia and pleurisy. Among ages 5-17, the leading hospitalization reason was psychoses, with three times the number of discharges at 43 than the second highest, vaginal delivery at 14. Thethird most common reason was childhood mental disorders, another psychiatric diagnosis.
Three of the top five hospitalization reasons for ages 18-44 w ere birth diagnoses: v aginal delivery, Cesarean section, both uncomplicated and accompanied by comorbid conditions. Psychoses and dgestive disorders were most common among this age group, apart from birth diagnoses. Middle-aged county residents ages 45-64 as well as ages 65-74 were most likely hospitalized for COPD and hip/knee replacement. Among the oldest age group, ages 75+, heart failure and shock, pneumonia and pleurisy, and nutritional/metabolic disorders were the leading hospitalization reasons, each accounting for more than 100 discharges in 2006.
Two general community hospitals are located in Knox County – Galesburg Cottage Hospital and OSF St. Mary Medical Center. Galesburg Cottage had functioned as a not-for-profit corporation through 2003, but was acquired by Community Health Systems in 2004. During 2005, the two hospitals admitted 10,012 inpatients with a total of 45,516 patient days for an average stay of 4.5 days. In terms of admissions, patient days, births, and surgeries, the two hospitals reported very similar utilization in 2005.
The Galesburg hospitals served 32,994 patients in their emergency departments during 2005 or about 90 patients per day. By hospital, Cottage Hospital served 13,960 and OSF St. Mary cared for 19,034 emergency patients.
A total of 1,016 residents lived in one of 17 long-term care facilities in Knox County in 2005. Three in ten (29.5%) of these individuals had a primary diagnosis of developmental disability. Ranking second and third in terms of frequency were circulatory conditions and Alzheimer's disease.
Among 2005 patients in the county's long-term nursing care units, three in four (73.5%) were female, 45.7% were ages 85 years and older, and about half (55.6%) used Medicaid as their primary p ayment source, follo wed by pr ivate pay (28.5%). Pati ents in intermediate care/developmental disability unit s were roughly split between male (55.5%) and female (44.5%), most commonly ages 45-64 years old (52.5%), and almost exclusively (99.7%) used Medicaid to pay for care. The 39 shelter care patients were about one-quarter (28.2%) male and three-quarters (71.8%) female, mostly (59.0%) ages 85 years and older, and all were private pay patients.
Based on American Medical Association data, 82 active patient care physicians were based in Knox County as of December 31, 2005 for a population per physician ratio of 650.3 persons per physician, surpassing the U.S. ratio of 412.7 persons per physician. Among specialties, only family medicine/general practice physicians serve a small er population (2,962.3 per physician) in Knox County than nationwide (3,953.6).
Compared to the state, Kn ox County has a greater supply, relative to population, of nurses, both registered and licensed practical, dietetic technicians, emergency medical technicians and paramedics, home health aides, physical therapists, and occupational therapists. In notably

shorter supply are dental p ersonnel, including dentists, hygienists, and dental assistants, pharmacists, and veterinarians.

Chapter 13: Crime And Violence

Knox County reported 2,328 crimes in 2006, more than any year in the previous decade. The county's 2006 crime rate of 4,367.0 per 100,000 population topped the Illinois rate of 3,740.1 by 17%. When examined by specific crime category, Knox County rates exceeded Illinois for criminal sexual assault, burglary, and theft. However, the county's robbery rate was very low (54.4) compared to the state (186.6), as was motor vehicle theft (90.0, Knox County; 297.9, Illinois).
Among the county's communities, Galesburg exhibited the highest 2006 crime rate at 5,687.6 per 100,000 population. Reporting the second highest crime level was Knoxville whose 2006 rate of 2,995.0 was 11% above their 2005 level. East Galesburg and Williamsfield experienced substantial one-year rises in crime rates, while 2006 rates fell from 2005 levels for Abingdon and Yates City.
Drug-related arrests accelerated rapidly in Knox County during the 1990s and early 2000s, increasing fourfold from 74 arrests in1990 to 374in 2005. Drug arrests peaked in 2004 at 764 arrests for a rate of 1,402.1 arests per 100,000 population, three times the state rate. In 2005 similar to the two prior years, the bulk of arrests is divided between violation of cannabis and controlled substances acts.
A total of 544domestic related offenses was reported by Knox County police departments and the sheriff's office in 2005. Of these domestic related offenses, seven in ten (70.6%) involved domestic battery, while 12.5% were violations of orders of protection.
Over one-fourth (27.8%) of Knox County adults live in a home containing a gun according to the 2004 Behavioral Risk Factor Survey. Most likely to keep a gun at home were households with an income of \$50,000 or more (42.6%), males (40.6%), and married persons (34.3%). Least likely were widowed individuals (14.3%), those with a household income of less than \$15,000 (15%), and persons who are out of work (17.6%).
Knox County recorded 82 reports of elder abuse during FY 2006 for a rate of 8.8 per 1,000 persons aged 65 and dder. The number of elder abuse reports, including both substantiated and unsubstantiated cases, has increased since the 1990s when the number of elder abuse cases fell below 70.
During 2005, reports of child abuse in Knox County numbered 828, a rate of 74.6 per 1,000 children ages 0-17, more than double the state rate of 30.0 and the county's highest level in 15 years. Of the reported cases, 219 (26.4% of reported) were indicated, for a rate of 19.7.
