#### **COVID-19 Vaccine Booster Shots**

#### If you received Pfizer

Everyone ages 5 and older **should get a Pfizer booster at least 5 months** after completing their initial Pfizer vaccination series. Individuals aged 5-17 years old can get a Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine booster. Adults 18 years and older can get either Pfizer or Moderna as a booster dose.

#### If you received Moderna

Everyone ages 18 and older **should get a booster at least 5 months** after completing their initial Moderna vaccination series. Adults 18 years and older can get either Pfizer or Moderna as a booster dose.

#### If you received Janssen (J&J)

Everyone ages 18 and older should receive a booster does at least 2 months after receiving their Janssen/J&J COVID-19 vaccine. The CDC prefers either of the mRNA vaccines (**Pfizer** or **Moderna**) as a booster dose. (**The Knox County Health Department does not currently have J&J available**)

#### 2<sup>nd</sup> Booster Shot – What You Should Know:

Individuals 12 years and older who are moderately or severely immunocompromised and adults 50 years and older who are not moderately or severely immunocompromised may choose to receive a receive a second booster of Moderna or Pfizer 4 months after their first booster dose.

#### **Accessing Vaccine Records**

If you need a copy of your vaccine record you can access it through IDPH's immunization portal, Vax Verify. Vax Verify now includes SMART<sup>TM</sup> Health Card, an easy way to share your COVID-19 vaccination status. The SMART<sup>TM</sup> Health Card allows users to download a QR code which individuals can use to confirm their COVID-19 vaccination status.

You can access the Vax Verify portal directly.

You can also contact the place where you were vaccinated for your vaccine record.

#### **Get Vaccinated and Stay Up To Date**

Being Up to Date on your vaccines means a person has received all recommended COVID-19 vaccines, including any booster dose(s) when eligible.

Fully vaccinated means a person has received their primary series of COVID-19 vaccines.

You are up to date with your COVID-19 vaccines when you have followed the current recommendations listed below. The recommendations will be different depending on your age, health status, and when you first got vaccinated.
